# <u> Advancing Interdisciplinary Research in Singing – SSHRC MCRI</u>

The AIRS SSHRC Major Collaborative Research Initiative is now well into the  $2^{nd}$  year of operations. This newsletter provides an update on some of the recent activities beginning with the AIRS  $2^{nd}$  Annual meeting and moving on to plans for future meetings.

## I. AIRS 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Meeting, Seattle, August 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2010.

Over 50 researchers of singing attended the AIRS 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Meeting, held in Seattle, at the Watertown Hotel. Approximately half of the attendees were students or young professionals. The 12-hour meeting began at 9 am with teleconferenced greetings from the AIRS Advisory Board members Dr. Hilary Apfelstadt and Dr. Philip Smith, AIRS Advisory Board members. Patricia Campbell, a member of the ICMPC Committee and a Faculty member of the University of Washington offered words of welcome. AIRS Director Annabel Cohen then overviewed the AIRS Project, followed by each of three AIRS Theme Leaders (Frank Russo, Patricia Campbell, and Jennifer Nicol) and several of their respective Sub-Theme Leaders (Christine Tsang, Sandra Trehub, and Rachel Heydon). After a coffee break and poster previewing, members of each of the three themes to met separately prior to lunch. During this time, a Digital Library team meeting took place with Jonathan Lane (IT Tech Co-ordinator, UPEI), Ichiro Fujinaga (McGill), and Theresa Leonard (the Banff Centre), augmented later in the day with George Tzanatakis (University of Victoria).

The Technical Program in the afternoon showcased 18 oral presentations and 8 posters representing research in each of the 9 sub-themes conducted over the last year, much of which was inspired by and in part funded by AIRS. The day ended with a Thai dinner buffet and a unique concert performed by AIRS attendees (including participation by the entire group). The program represented the cultures of North India, Iceland, Greece, Atlantic Canada, Tanzania, and France, and American musical theatre and Italian opera. Throughout the day, performance and participatory singing enlivened the more serious program. Thanks go out to each and every one for taking the extra day prior to ICMPC11 to participate and contribute. Many people travelled great distances to attend the AIRS meeting and the efforts of everyone made the AIRS meeting as worthwhile as had been planned.

The printed program included the abstracts and biographies of all presentations and posters, concert program, biographies of performers, music for several songs for the AIRS song book, and annual reports from each of the sub-themes. Photos (soon to be available on the web-site and a few of which are included in the newsletter), are a reminder of the extensiveness of the program and the positive spirit of co-operation and goodwill resounding during the meeting.

Considerable financial resources are directed to our AIRS annual meetings as these meetings are the one time each year that a good cross-section of the AIRS collaborators, from students to senior researchers, can come together, share ideas and get a sense of the entire scope and progress of the project. The meeting was deliberately held in conjunction with the International Conference on Music Perception and Cognition (ICMPC11) that independently

drew many of the AIRS collaborators to it, and for which many AIRS collaborators had independent funding.

Special interest group meetings. As well as providing an up-to-date overview of the field of music perception and cognition, the 5-day ICMPC conference enabled AIRS collaborators to continue conversations begun at the AIRS Annual meeting. Many took advantage of this opportunity. Themes 1.1, 1.2, 1.3, and 3.3 also held separate meetings. The meeting of Team 3.3 (Singing and Health) led to the suggestion of sharing of its posters on the AIRS web-site. Members of theme 1.3 (AIRS Test Battery) followed through on its plan of reviewing the various components of the AIRS test battery on the beautiful "free" afternoon of Wednesday, August 25<sup>th</sup>, continuing throughout the evening, and materializing in plans for next steps. Andrea Emberly, the leader of the Student and Young Professional Group, organized an AIRS pizza lunch the day after the Annual Meeting, with an attendance of over 20 students, recent Ph. D.'s and post-docs. This group now has plans to keep in communication and to produce an annual newsletter.

AIRS at ICMPC. AIRS was also well represented in the formal ICMPC program in two multi-authored talks presented in the large room that was filled to capacity. Clearly there is interest in what AIRS is doing. I would like to thank the presenters Frank Russo, Sandra Trehub, Christine Tsang, Jennifer Nicol, Rachel Heydon and Patricia Campbell for their preparation and

co-ordination of this event. Many of the AIRS collaborators also presented during the ICMPC meeting, and the spirit of AIRS resonated throughout the entire ICMPC conference.

Policy and Planning Committee. The Policy and Planning meeting (comprised of the Theme and Committee Leaders) met on August 21<sup>st</sup>, the evening prior to the AIRS Annual Meeting. The members provided brief reviews of all sub-themes with respect to the milestone timeline. The primary focus was on future planning and policy development in the context of the achievement of the milestones. It was noted that the development of the first two policies (Policy 1: Student Funding Distribution, and Policy 2: Travel) in the first year was key to mobilizing the activities within each of the sub-themes.

Students from far and wide. Not all AIRS collaborators could attend the AIRS meeting and ICMPC. However, several of them, such as Lauren Stewart, Isabelle Peretz, and Nathalie Henrich, were represented by their students. The large number of student attendees at the Annual Meeting is an AIRS success, as one of the goals of AIRS is to provide students with opportunities to participate in scholarly meetings and interact with peers, and junior and senior scholars. Among these opportunities is also the chance to share cultural perspectives. The AIRS annual meeting achieved this by bringing together researchers from Australia, Brazil, Canada, Estonia, France, Germany, Iceland, India, Japan, Poland, Switzerland, Tanzania, United Kingdom, United States, and included persons of Chinese and Greek origin as well. This also led to an eclectic concert program held in the relaxed atmosphere of the Thai restaurant which AIRS had to itself on the evening of the 22nd.

# 1. Island Songs: A Global Repertoire of Roots and Routes Editor Godfrey Baldacchino

Godfrey Baldacchino, AIRS co-investigator, Theme 3.1 Co-leader, and Canada Research Chair in Island Studies has signed a book contract with Scarecrow Press (well known for academic publishing with a particular interest in music, song, and singing) for the edited book *Island Songs: A Global Repertoire of Roots and Routes.* The 16 chapters will contribute to this first systematic socio-anthropological and global study of the unfolding bases and practices of contemporary island song using an "Island Studies" lens. Well-done Godfrey!

# 2. UNESCO OBSERVATORY Special Issue – Larry O'Farrell (guest editor)

Larry O'Farrell has guest edited Vol. 2 Issue 1 of the UNESCO Observatory a peer-reviewed on-line journal. The issue is entitled Perspectives on Singing, and organizes the submissions around the AIRS Theme structure. The URL is

# 4. New publication committee to form.

Books or monograph are the natural outcome for a project of the scope of the AIRS Major Research Initiative. Already as above, Godfrey Baldacchino will be publishing a book on Island Songs, with submission of the entire manuscript in early 2011, and Larry O'Farrell's special issue in the UNESCO Observatory is already published. Co-ordination of publication initiatives

will be an AIRS priority, aided by the formation of a committee of collaborators interested in this endeavor. The AIRS Steering Committee has endorsed this activity, and specifically, as one publication project, the idea for example of a 3-volume set on Interdisciplinary Research in Singing, with one volume representing each of the three AIRS themes: Volume 1: Development of Singing, Volume 2: Singing and Education, and Volume 3: Singing and Well-being. This does not of course preclude other initiatives on either special topics or across themes, and already we are seeing these taking place in the form of special issues of journals and the Baldacchino edited volume.

Whereas in Year 1, the Sub-theme leaders focused on providing a foundation for their sub-theme, as a result, this year they are in better position of engaging all members of the sub-theme in achieving the milestones for the sub-theme. At the same time, collaborations across sub-themes within and across the three major themes are taking place and are highly consistent with the Milestone goals. The SSHRC agency has funded a set of integrated projects which could not take place without the grant. AIRS research thrives through the sharing of information, and through the good-will among collaborators.

Communications. The home base at UPEI is committed to creating an effective communication center. We have gone for a year without a fully functioning web-site and without a digital library. In part this arose as a result of the restructuring of basic digital technologies by the Library Digital Team at UPEI. This activity seems to have been completed and no longer provides a bottleneck to our progress. Effort is being made to acquire more assistance in the management of communications so that members of the entire network are

easily informed, so that meetings can be set within and among sub-themes, and so that information is posted appropriately in public and private areas. Your feedback on communications or concerns about communications is welcomed. Suggestions of what you would like to see on the web-site are welcome. Importance of the Milestone document. A complex network of collaborators needs both a solid foundation and specific goals like the ones we have stated in the document for each subtheme. The Milestone document and the AIRS overall research organizational structure are solid. If we focus on these specific sub-themes, as described in the Milestone document and as evident in our organizational structure, it will be easier to address the issue of overlap among subthemes. If the sub-themes are too vague, interesting overlaps and synergies will not emerge because of the general heterogeneity. It is the job of the sub-theme leaders or co-leaders to address the goals and time-lines of the Milestone document for their sub-theme with the help of the members in their sub-theme. This could well entail a sub-theme group problem-solving session about how best to address the milestone goals.

Plea to team leaders and members. Annabel Cohen, the AIRS Director, asks that team leaders, sub-theme leaders, and sub-theme members focus on the milestone document because the accomplishment of the goals for the sub-theme is needed for the project as a whole. All participants in the sub-theme do not need to be simultaneously active, but openness is needed to those who are not currently involved and would like to be. Eventually everyone who belongs to a sub-theme will play a key role in the sub-theme. Funding is always less than is needed, but with bright persons collaborating on important problems, the possibility of obtaining additional resources presents itself as does the possibility of achieving the research goals with the clever use of funds and human and other resources available. SSHRC MCRI grants might be regarded as providing seed money that can enable additional grants. Bright students interested in singing will hopefully be competitive in non-AIRS competitions so that they can work with you. Already we have examples of this. AIRS funding resources next year (Year 3) are slightly more than in Year 2. A new competition for student support will soon be upon us (deadline in late January), and each sub-theme once again will be asked to submit proposals based on projects submitted by members of the subtheme (as per our Policy #1 on Student Funding). Year 3 funding also supports a new AIRS post-doctoral fellow position and decisions will be made by the Policy and Planning Committee regarding how this position will be advertised. Students. AIRS is grateful to the many students, from undergraduate to postdoctoral, who have a focus on research on singing. They will be most helpful in meeting the goals of AIRS. Due to the meeting during ICMPC in Seattle, organized by Andrea Emberly, they are developing their own community, and they will also produce a private bi-annual blog and one

public annual AIRS newsletter. With inspirational interchanges with their faculty collaborators of AIRS, AIRS will advance interdisciplinary research in singing as intended. #### IV. News of AIRS Collaborators and Students

#### Jennifer Nicol – New Editor of CJMT.

Congratulations to Jennifer Nicol who has been appointed the new Editor of the Canadian Journal of Music Therapy. She will stay on as team leader of Theme 3.3 Singing and Health and Well-being, but is stepping down from her position as Leader of Theme 3. Mary Gick has agreed to replace Jennifer in May. Mary has already served in this capacity for one year, when Jennifer delayed taking on the position until the 2<sup>nd</sup> year of AIRS.

Kedmon Mapana off to Tanzania – toward 2.1 goals what children sing naturally

Under the supervision of Dr. Patricia Campbell, graduate student Kedmon Mapana is off to examine the songs of the Wagogo children of Central Tanzania. The Wagogo are a Bantu ethnic group of rural Tanzania living in pastoral and agricultural communities situated about 300 miles inland from the Indian Ocean. Wagogo vocal music is characteristically polyphonic, with melodies set in a modal system. While collection, analysis, and interpretation of Wagogo children's songs are the main points of the project, there are several questions worthy of examination: What is the musical content of these songs, particularly with regard to melodic, rhythmic, and textural components? What are the texts and topics of the songs? Can children sing these traditional harmonies, or do they sing in unison? At what point do Wagogo children begin to harmonize, vocally? Are there developmental stages at which children sing particular songs? With his audiovideo recorder in hand, Kedmon will be bringing back to Seattle answers to these important questions with some of his materials to be imported to the digital library.

#### Henrietta Lempert from 2.3 Using singing to teach

Henrietta Lempert's AIRS project has potential implications for post-critical period second language learning. It examines whether singing voice enhances acquisition of novel morphosyntax compared to speaking voice prosody. She reports that the project is on schedule, thanks to her team of amazing, musically talented undergraduate students — Wen (Wendy) Xin, who has training in classical singing, and makes artificial language sequences sound aesthetically pleasing, Michal Chawel, whose music editing expertise is at the heart of their good progress, and Shabam Olga Nasimi, who ensures they are adhering to Wen's musical script. Experiment 1 is ready for piloting in January 2011, with the ethics review well behind them.

# Graduate student Sally Busch wins CIHR graduate award

Sally Busch a graduate student of Mary Gick's has recently learned that she has won a Canadian Institute of Health Research (CIHR) - Frederick Banting and Charles Best Canada Graduate Scholarships – Master's Award. This prestigious award will enable her to move efficiently in her research on the role of singing in health (Theme 3) under Dr. Gick's supervision.

Theme 3.2 Intergenerational Singing Program soon to be rolled out.

Suzie O'Neill an AIRS co-investigator with Rachel Heydon and Carol Beynon at the University of Western Ontario focusing on the Theme 3.2 Singing and Intergenerational Understanding has recently taken a position at Simon Fraser University in the Faculty of Education. Carol Beynon recently took on the position of Dean of Education at the University of Western Ontario. With theme leader Rachel Heydon, the dedicated trio has been humming along with their various activities in Theme 3.2, and they will roll out their first Intergenerational (IG) singing program in January at the London Ontario site. They have been meeting frequently, "and are really excited. The curriculum promises to be novel but well grounded and is based on their previous research and experience." reports Carol Beynon.

Cross-cultural understanding through singing: classrooms in Portugal – Theme 3.1 An important study on the role of singing in reducing prejudiced attitudes had been conducted by Félix Neto and his colleagues M. Sousa and E. Mullet "Can music change ethnic attitudes among children?". Psychology of Music, 33, 304-316. It was important to replicate and extend this study, and Félix Neto reports that with the help of AIRS the study has now been extended and is underway.

Developing a songbook for China, Kenya, Brazil and Canada – Theme 3.1

A further approach to the study of cross-cultural understanding through singing is the project led by **Lily Chen-Hafteck** that entails teaching the songs of China, Kenya, Brazil and Canada to Grade 5 children in these 4 countries. Members from each of the countries met at Kean University in March at a conference on Creativity and Education (organized by Lily Chen-Hafteck) and later at the International Society for Music Education meeting in Beijing. The development of a song-book of the four cultures is underway. Elizabeth Adango has made much progress on the Kenyan collection already. The compilation includes not only audio materials but also pictorial and possibly video.

# V. AIRS 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Meeting – St. John's Nfld. July 10, 2011 Preliminary Announcement

The AIRS 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Meeting will take place in St. John's Newfoundland on July 10<sup>th</sup> in conjunction with the Festival 500 and the Phenomenon of Singing International Symposium VIII. The Policy and Planning Committee Meeting (for Theme leaders, Committee Leaders) will take place on July 9<sup>th</sup> (Saturday) beginning early evening. The morning of July 10<sup>th</sup> will be devoted to the review of the work of AIRS of the last 12 months year bringing all members in attendance onto the same page and providing opportunities for the AIRS collaborators to meet together in person. The afternoon will feature research presentations by AIRS collaborators and co-investigators including some students. This will be a plenary session not only for AIRS researchers but also for the Phenomenon of Singing Symposium as a whole. An AIRS poster session will also take place that day. Dr. Andrea Rose, cocoordinator of the Festival 500 and Symposium will also provide opportunities for AIRS research to be presented throughout the Phenomenon of Singing Symposium proper, and some of the AIRS members have already made

submissions earlier to that effect. Additional abstracts will still be considered. These will be sent first to AIRS with an indication as whether the contributor would be happy to present at either the AIRS annual meeting or at the Festival 500 Symposium.

Similar to last year, travel support for at least one student from each of the 9 sub-themes will be awarded through a competition entailing submission of forms associated with the AIRS Travel Policy, which will shortly be available on the web-site. Each Theme Leader and sub-theme leader should see to it that at least one candidate from each sub-theme is encouraged to submit an application. More submissions are of course welcome. Support will also be provided to key members of the policy and planning committee. All AIRS collaborators are urged to consider attending this meeting. Efforts will be made to obtain additional sources of funding, and we encourage all collaborators to attempt to seek out their own funding if at all possible. Funds will be used in the first instance to assure a program representing excellent scholarship as well as an appropriate balance and representation of the AIRS themes, disciplines, and geographic and culture, with a focus also on those collaborators who have been actively pursuing the AIRS goals.

Necessary forms for abstract submission and request for travel support will soon be made available on the AIRS web-site.

# VI. AIRS 4th Annual Meeting and Mid-Term Review – UPEI, Aug. 2012

Though it seems far off now, the AIRS 4<sup>th</sup> Annual meeting (August, 2012) is a most important one, and will take place at the University of Prince Edward Island in late August coinciding with the mid-term review. An external review Committee selected by SSHRC will be on site during part of this time, reviewing the progress of AIRS with respect to the milestone document. The summer of 2012 is that of the ICMPC12, which will take place in Athens in July 23-28, 2012 coordinating with the preceding ISME biennial meeting which is also to take place in Athens. Due to the mid-term review, the AIRS Annual meeting must take place in PEI, however, from a timing standpoint, it will still be possible for participants to attend all meetings, and for AIRS to be represented in some way at ICMPC and ISME.

# VII. Future Meetings of interest to AIRS Collaborators

Other opportunities for AIRS members to come together are provided by many other meetings at which symposia, paper sessions, or poster groupings might be welcome. At such meetings, it might be possible to schedule a special pre- or post- meeting workshop, focusing on a special topic connected to singing, or such a session might be incorporated into the program. Please think about these possibilities. Last year there were AIRS sessions or gatherings at a number of meetings: Canadian Acoustical Association (Niagara on the Lake), Canadian Arts and Learning Symposium (Toronto), Educating the Creative Mind (Union, New Jersey), MENC (Anaheim), ISME (Beijing), and of course ICMPC (Seattle). Currently organization of a symposium for the International Symposium on Performance Science is being initiated by Frank Russo.

# Past 1-Day Summer Workshop at UPEI – Focus on Singing and Development, Education & Well-Being.

On August 12, 2010, a full-day program plus evening concert took place co-organized with AIRS Post-doctoral Fellow Anick Lamarche. Key-note speaker was Psyche Loui from Harvard Medical School. Introductory remarks were offered by the UPEI Dean of Arts Richard Kurial, and Chair of the Psychology Department and AIRS Advisory Board Member Philip Smith. Annabel Cohen provided an overview of AIRS, and the AIRS Test Battery. Presentations were made by AIRS members in the vicinity: Jennifer Sullivan (St. Francis Xavier University), Martha Gabriel (UPEI), and Godfrey Baldachino (UPEI), as well as the visiting summer research students Lauren Mitchell, Kamille La Rosa, and Kuori Akagi (all from Kalamazoo College, Michigan), and Ruth Reveal (from Agnes Scott College in Georgia), UPEI Music student Kelly Leighton, doctoral student Andreas Hirt (University of Otago - New Zealand) and Jonathan Lane (AIRS Tech Coordinator). AIRS member Sung-Ha Shin-Bouey gave a workshop on basic steps to singing, and an Open-House behind the scenes AIRS Laboratory visit was provided. AIRS partner Young at Heart Musical Theatre for Seniors Inc was represented by its Director, Catherine O-Brien. Eva Götell from Sweden made a presentation via videoconference on caregiver singing for dementia patients. Local music therapist Elizabeth Gallant also made a presentation. An evening concert featured vocal performers: Collette Cheverie, Jennifer Farrell, Riley Sorensen, Sylvia AbiKhattar-Mutch, Anick Lamarche, Andreas Hirt, Ruth Reveal, Tara Llewelyn, Tony Reddin, Teresa Doyle, Meaghan and Bridgette Blanchard, Pierce Clarke, Michelle Bouey, and Sung Ha Shin-Bouey. They well represented the Vocal Mosaic of AIRS with a variety of styles including American ballad, opera (Monteverdi, Verdi, Gounod, Mozart, Strauss), musical theatre, Gaelic, Scottish (with harp accompaniment), and English folksongs, Spanish (de Falla, accompanied by guitar), the Beatles, and Spirituals. The assistance of students Kristin MacDonald and Denise Beaton, and of Deborah Annear, Dale Sorenson and Robert Drew is also acknowledged.

# IX. Update on the AIRS Digital Library and the AIRS Web-site

Dear AIRS members,

The AIRS Digital Library Team has been busy working on the design of a robust and accessible data architecture scheme for our Digital Library application. We have also discussed the possibility of integrating the research data to be collected by AIRS and stored in our Digital Library, with the audio analysis tools under development by Dr. George Tzanetakis and his research staff, at University of Victoria. This is an exciting prospect for the future of the AIRS Digital Library and a collaboration we really hope to foster in the near future, with the help of AIRS researchers who have been or are currently are engaged in data collection.

This is where we ask for your help: In order to properly design the underlying data structure for the Digital Library, we will need example research data from researchers who are collecting data with the intent of contributing that data to the Digital Library. At this point, we need to establish a technical map of the data being collected by the research groups in each AIRS sub-theme. This will allow us to start answering the outstanding questions of how do we best store, preserve, and access our data. What we ask is that you provide a sample of data that is being created/collected by your current AIRS-related projects. Representation from each sub-theme would be highly beneficial, so please check with your intra-theme colleagues and sub-theme leader about your ideal data submission. Formatting and quality is not an issue currently, since we will be establishing data standards based on what is being used currently in AIRS and what is considered "best practice" for these data types. Please send us copies of original data, as recorded, so we have a clear picture of what kind of data individual groups will be generating, before compression for storage.

This sample data will also enable us to have some early data objects to test the integration with Dr. Tzanetakis' analysis tools, which is sounds very promising for AIRS and audio analysis in general.

For those who have concerns regarding privacy and security of data samples provided to the Digital Library Team, rest assured that any sample data we receive will only be visible to developers and testers of the Digital Library project, all whom will be members of AIRS. Neither the test system nor the data will be visible to the public at any time. All data samples can be sent to the AIRS Information Technology Coordinator, Jonathan M. Lane. His email is interception and you can reach him by phone at the AIRS office, +1 (902) 566-6023. Most data samples will be too large in file size to send via email, so we will arrange for a "dropbox" service to be listed on our Web site (http://www.airsplace.ca/) to upload large data files and/or archives.

If you have any questions or concerns about the requested data samples or an aspect of the Digital Library project, feel free to contact Jonathan. We also welcome any AIRS members who wish to be involved in the Digital Library Team to contact us for inclusion in future meetings and discussion.




